 - 1. Call To Order: Mr. Young called the meeting to order at 7:00PM.
 - 2. **Pledge of Allegiance**: Suzie Swenson led the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 15 **Questions, Announcements and Presentations:** Mr. Greenberg mentioned that on August 19th the Londonderry High School gym will host a major political event regarding education. The district was contacted by Harbinger Outreach who organizes large and high stake events. There are going to be two education summits: One in NH and Iowa. New Hampshire will feature the Republican presidential candidates. The event will run from 9:00AM-4:00PM. There will be about 150-200 local and national media. The individuals will be interviewed
- separately. Jeb Bush, Carly Fiorina, Bobby Jindal, and Scott Walker have confirmed and waiting for final confirmation from others. Londonderry was picked due to the reputation of the school district. This event will receive national recognition for our high school and for the community. The event will be by invitation only and will have between 300-500 people. Some Londonderry students will be allowed to follow the press and meet the candidates. 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6. <u>Deliberations</u>

- 6.1 To see what action(s) the Board will take regarding an amendment to the Charter: Mr. Curro said we are discussing this tonight because the law requires several state departments to sign off on the amendment before it goes to the voters. Mr. Curro mentioned that we need to move this along or it may not be ready to be placed on the warrant. This is to address the court order and to remove the quorum requirement from the charter next year. The amendment is to remove anything that relates to a quorum in the deliberative session. This is strictly to address the quorum. Mr. Young confirmed that we need to take action before the August 4th meeting. Mr. Young stated that we are looking to delete Section IV.C and delete the last sentence of Section VI.A.2. In section VII.B.1 delete: "regardless of whether a quorum of the meeting is present at the meeting"; and delete Section VII.B.2. Mr. Young mentioned that they will take action at the next meeting.
- To see what action(s) the Board will take regarding the Rabbit Environmental Protected Easement M.O.U (Memorandum of Understanding). Mr. Curro said the district was approached by the State to establish a rabbit habitat in conjunction with the town. There is a small parcel that is owned by the town and a small parcel owned by the school district. This is located behind the High School and the Middle School in an area that we have really no use or plans for in regard to fields or events. There is a significant drop and that would require an enormous amount of fill. Attorney Graham has stated that it would be beneficial to take further action via a warrant article this coming March to identify this area. Since the identified area also includes a parcel owned by the Town, the Town Council will need to approve a separate MOU for the use of land within their identified parcel. Mr. Curro mentioned that Attorney Graham has worded it so we could vote tonight. Mike Manson from the State Fish and Game and Deb Lievens from the Londonderry Conservation Committee are present for any questions. Mr. Curro mentioned that if the Board approved the MOU tonight for the small area, Attorney Graham felt a more formal arrangement should go on the March ballot of 2016. Mr. Curro suggested a larger area for them because it acts as a big buffer between residential area and the schools. Mr. Curro pulled up a slide and explained that the MOU addresses the orange color on the map/slide. Mr. Young mentioned that it appears the majority is part of a PSNH easement. Mr. Lekas asked if there is a shortage of rabbits in town. Mr. Manson said it is the New England Cottontail they are creating this habitat for. Mr. Manson goes on to explain that there are a lot of species that rely on this habitat. He is excited for this location because of its proximity to the school and there may be the ability for the students to do some research down the road. Ms. Lievens said this rabbit needs a lot of cover and will make it much safer from species. Mr. Laferriere asked if they are cutting trees down and clearing and what will it look like. Mr. Manson said the trees will initially be removed to create dense shrubs. Mr. Manson said its positioning to the utility lines is not accidental and their hope is to combine the two parcels and make for one large habitat. Mr. Laferriere asked what type of diseases do these rabbits bring. Mr. Manson said this area is one of the last remaining locations for the rabbits' existence. Mr. Laferriere asked if the predators are going to increase because we are increasing the rabbit population. Mr. Manson is not aware of any unique disease in rabbits. Mr. Laferriere asked about rabies and Mr. Manson said any mammal can carry rabies. Ms. Lievens said this will also increase the bird population, Mr. Manson said utility maintenance happens every five or six years and then their habitat is disturbed. Mr. Manson said the New England cottontail thrives better in a large patch. Mr. Young confirmed that there is no way for a student to walk to the school or could there be in the future in this area. Mr. Curro stated no because it is very wet and there are gas lines. Mr. Young asked that if this animal becomes endangered does it affect our students in any way. He wanted to make sure that Fish and Game cannot shut the district down if something like this occurs. Mr. Manson said that would be the environmental agency not them. Mr. Young wanted to make sure it doesn't come back to hurt the school district. Mr. Manson said we can decide down the road that if we don't want to participate and manage the habitat then we can pull out. Mr. Laferriere asked again if we are clear cutting. Ms. Lievens said it will be pretty flat and clear cut. She said the roots and the stump will remain and it will be shrub height. Mr. Manson said the more removed the better the regeneration and maximize the project. Mr. Laferriere made the motion to support and accept the Rabbit Environmental Protected Easement MOU. Seconded by Mr. Lekas. Motion was denied by a vote of 1-2-0. Mr. Curro asked what else does the Board needs from this group. Mr. Laferriere said he is not convinced that this is a real need at this time and wanted more information. Ms. Lievens said maybe they could all do a field trip. Mr. Laferriere said he knows exactly what that land offers and he is not convinced mowing it down for rabbits is right. Mr. Curro asked how do they proceed – should they come back or does the Board want more information. Mr. Laferriere said he wanted more information on predators, disease and where else this is being done and more accurate numbers. They will put it back on the agenda down the road once they have additional information.

Motion passed 3-0-0 15 To see what action(s) the Board will take regarding the first reading of the following new policies: (Green packet): 6.4.1 Policy EEA – Student Transportation Services: Mr. Curro mentioned that it was suggested by the State to update our policy. The new policy was easier to rescind the one on the books and rewrite a 20 whole new policy. This new policy includes rules of transporting students, parent involvement and conduct of students on the bus. The only two changes to the rules are the maximum walking distance is .3 for elementary and .5 for Middle School and High School. Right now, we provide transportation as best we can on Class 6 roads. This policy would not allow the school district to provide student transportation on those roads or section of roads classified as class 6. Class 6 roads are not maintained by the town, plowed or graded. They are just gravel pathways 25 wide enough for one vehicle to go one way. We have in the past provided transportation and in the winter we have had a problem with busses getting stuck. We cannot plow, salt or sand these roads. The town has to accept these Class 6 roads. Attorney Graham has suggested that we don't provide transportation on these sections, but Mr. Curro mentioned since there are families that live on these roads it becomes a liability. Mr. Curro mentioned that when a family purchases a house on these roads they are given a document that they understand that there are no town 30 services. Mr. Laferriere asked if we have a bus that goes down Scobie Pond Road. Mr. Curro said we have a couple minibuses that we use for these roads, but we have had to pull them out before with a wrecker. This policy was reviewed by Attorney Graham. 7. Superintendent's Report

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- 7.1 NEASC Report Jay Parent, Kim Lindley-Soucy, Steve Juster: Steve and Kim are chairs of this committee and provide leadership for our staff. There is a letter from the NEASC (New England Association of Schools and Colleges) which gives a broad view of the positive aspects of the school. We have received accreditation through 2020. Mr. Juster said the next step is a pre self-study that starts in 2017. We will put together smaller committees and look at the new standards that they will set up. There will be a visitation in the Spring of 2020. Mr. Parent will pick new chairs moving forward.
- 7.2 LHS Discipline Report Katie Sullivan: 269 incidents which compares to 193 incidents last year for the same time frame. 90% of students did not have a disciplinary incident. Graduating class went out in style with 91% of LHS seniors went on to 2 or 4 year college. 196 of 388 seniors were NH scholars and 24 seniors are moving on to serve our country in the Armed Forces. The administration is working on how to balance electronic devices in the school setting, cheating and plagiarism and keep the open door policy.
- 7.3 LMS Discipline Report Donna Dyer; There was a total of 200 incidents which compares to 235 last year at the same time. LMS continues to work on cell phone use. The Middle School started to focus more

on merits. Mr. Laliberte will be back to talk to students. As part of college and career ready, they try to keep kids in school and class. Mr. Lekas asked if there are ever alcohol related incidents and Mrs. Dyer said yes.
